



CLI C1 Syllabus

C1 level English is divided into two courses at CLI:

C1.1 & C1.2.

C1.1

The C1.1 level English CLI course has a duration of 60 hours, consisting of two lessons per week with each lesson lasting two hours.

Students must attend 80% of the C1.1 course in order to get a certificate of attendance and must pass the final test with at least 60% to gain a pass certificate and be eligible for the C1.2 course.

The final test is divided into the following parts:

Listening, Reading, Grammar and Vocabulary, Writing and Speaking. Speaking may be valued during the course and not as a part of the final test.

C1.2

The C1.2 level English CLI course has a duration of 60 hours, consisting of two lessons per week with each lesson lasting two hours.

Students must attend 80% of the C1.2 course in order to get a certificate of attendance and must pass the final test with at least 60% to gain a level certificate.

The final test is divided into the following parts:

Listening, Reading, Grammar and Vocabulary, Writing and Speaking

Objectives and competences

Upon completion of both the C1.1 and the C1.2 courses and in accordance with the CEFR description of C1, students should be able to:

1. Understand a wide range of demanding, longer texts, and recognise implicit meaning.
2. Express him/herself fluently and spontaneously without much obvious searching for expressions.
3. Produce clear, well-structured, detailed text on complex subjects, showing controlled use of organisational patterns, connectors and cohesive devices.
